Dear Parent/Carer,

We all know how important it is for our young learners to be able to read and to read well. This year we are working hard to engage and encourage our students to read widely and often across the whole school, not just in their English lessons.

**Did you know...**

- The average GCSE paper has a reading age of 15 years and 7 months...
- The average GCSE student has a reading age of 13 years...
- In Year 3 students read an average of 36 books a year...
- By Year 10 this is an average of 5 books a year...

**What can we do?**

- Reading for 6 minutes a day can reduce stress by 68%
- Read for 20 minutes a day and you'll read 1,800,000 words per year.
- Children who read 1,000,000 words a year are in the top two percent of reading achievement.
- Children learn between 4,000 and 12,000 words per year through reading.

We will be introducing our new 'Tutor Reads' programme across school from Monday 14<sup>th</sup> November. Please see the next page for an outline of the novel chosen and the themes that are included in it.

**What is Tutor Reads?**

- Each year group were given a choice of two novels to read. The whole year group will read the same novel, at the same time in their individual tutor groups.
- Form tutors will read the novel aloud each morning during tutor time.
- Students will follow along using bookmarks to track the story and ensure they are fully engaged in the novel.
- Students will be given reading logs to note down important questions, discussion points and any other ideas they may have as they read along
- Students will also be asked to note down any new vocabulary they come across, there will be a dictionaries and thesauri in each tutor room for students to use.


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## LORD OF THE FLIES

At the dawn of the next world war, a plane crashes on an uncharted island, stranding a group of schoolboys. At first, with no adult supervision, their freedom is something to celebrate; this far from civilization the boys can do anything they want. Anything. They attempt to forge their own society, failing, however, in the face of terror, sin and evil. And as order collapses, as strange howls echo in the night, as terror begins its reign, the hope of adventure seems as far from reality as the hope of being rescued. Labelled a parable, an allegory, a myth, a morality tale, a parody, a political treatise, even a vision of the apocalypse, Lord of the Flies is perhaps our most memorable novel about "the end of innocence, the darkness of man's heart."



The book that year 8 are reading has a number of sensitive themes within it. It is really important that you are aware of these before we read.

- Loss of childhood innocence
- Murder and death
- Loss of childhood innocence
- Dystopia

As a school we aware that there may be some people that have been through or who are going through some of the issues that we will see in the novel. We will ensure that these issues are approached and discussed in an appropriate, sensitive and mature way at all times.
